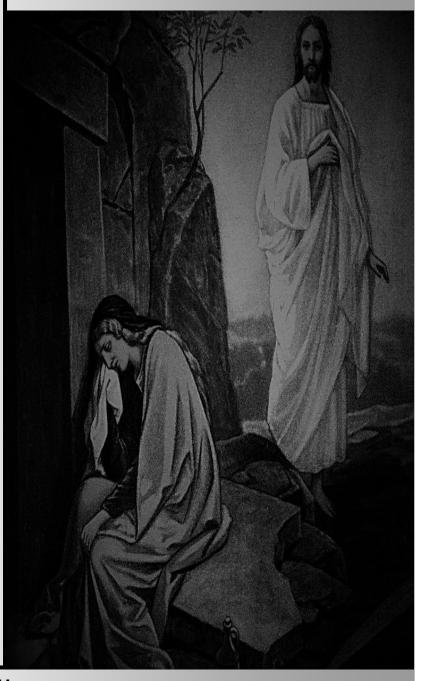

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A Personal Perspective on Aging

Aging just happens! It's a life -long process! We don't have to work for it; it just happens! The process begins with Infancy to Childhood, to Adolescence until we reach the "old" of the elderly (& that is where I am at!).. And throughout all these stages comes maturing in our physical, emotional, social and spiritual dimensions- and this is accomplished through trial and error; instruction and learning, ending up with each of us adapting and



adopting, until we feel comfortable and functional in ourselves & in society.

In my adolescence I became a health professional along with Christian education, so you would guess this learning would influence my future years in aging. Aside from utilizing this education on behalf of others, you would expect I would apply it to my own stage of aging! So, in spite of the usual aches and pains, it has been my choice to choose a healthy lifestyle which would include maintaining healthy diets, proper rest & sleep, and exercise- and speaking of exercise, I'm sure you're familiar with the phrase, "use it or lose it"; also, some nursing text-books say vigorous exercise is supposed to stimulate parts of brain proteins known as endorphins, which, when stimulated with exercise can take on similar action as opiates; therefore considered helpful in pain management. A healthy lifestyle would also include, not just warding off disease but also aim to have energy and enthusiasm to nourish one's own spirit, as well as maintaining social relationships and even contributing to our communities even if this included living with some chronic condition.

In Fall of 2017 I sustained a left paralyzed leg (doctors felt the cause may have been a sudden back jerk??) In any case this resulted in me needing to use a wheelchair- this was a tremendous set-back for me- not just physically but also emotionally and spiritually! I doubt that any of you escaped my plea of joining me in prayer that this problem may be resolved! I think I had 1/2 the world interceding for me! My prayers almost became one-sided, I scoured the Scriptures and any books I could lay my hands on to find help and comfort; especially books that spoke to the subject of miraculous or divine healing. I asked April and a deacon to come for a healing Service. At the same time, my Family Doctor arranged for a Cortisone-type injection into my back even though my doctor gave me little hope for possible help. It felt endless waiting nearly 2 months for that injection. But the hour finally arrived! I was told I needed to wait at least 3-4 days before the medication would "kick in". Nothing happened. Checking with a doctor-friend I inquired as to how long I may need to wait! After research his answer was: up to two weeks. But two weeks passed and nothing! Finally I surrendered to the Lord: "Lord, if you want me to live out my days, weeks, years in this state, so be it!" Never will I forget that time when days seemed like years! But I had no choice! After much searching, and tears, peace did come. My Model was Christ Himself in Gethsemane who also surrendered to His Heavenly Father! Then, Praise the Lord, another month down the road and one day I noticed some feeling in the leg- it was only about a week later that I could leave my wheelchair and return to my walker! What rejoicing! I give all the credit to the Lord!

In one of his books (??) Swiss Psychiatrist, Paul Tournier tells us that as we age, our physical, emotional and social abilities all begin to wane but that our spiritual dimension has the capacity to increase! What wonderful news this, together with the comforting Scriptures is! Thanks to "Him who is able too do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to His power that is at work within us, to Him be glory..." Eph. 3:20

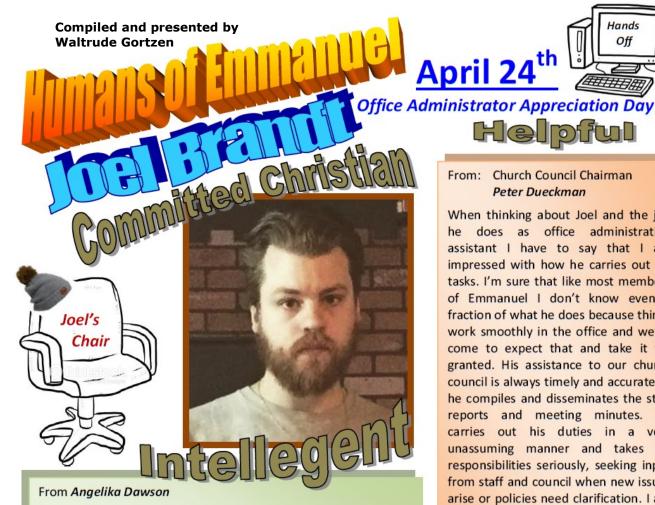
A Note from the Editor:

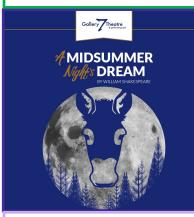

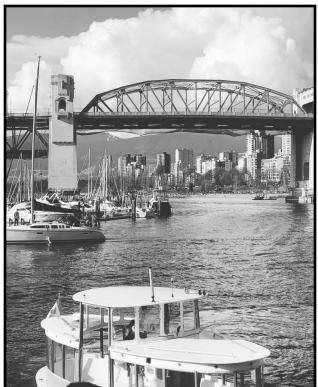

Many of our youth are lonely, looking for love, and desperately trying to find "anyone to spend time with". We want to help them see past the shallow, meaningless understanding of "love" so often popularized in our culture, to experience the freedom and joy found in the unconditional love of God.

One of the young girls we work with has a new boyfriend. She was in a relationship with another guy until recently that she knew was not right for her. She told one of our youth workers, Lindsey Dyck, what she is looking for in a guy - someone who likes "going for walks and seeing more places." She also said, "I am so glad that I am in a relationship. I could never be alone."

At the C-21 Youth Centre, our youth workers make meals, listen, and spend time being the hands and feet of Jesus. As we learn the stories of our amazing young people, we need God's compassion and understanding to help us respond them. Many are living burnt out lives. When they come to C-21, they see Jesus in the lives of our youth workers. Frequently our youth workers hear youth say that C-21 is "a place of rest", "feels like home" and helps them quickly "feel better".

Lindsey's heart filled with compassion as the young girl shared her insecurity, hunger for love, and desperation to be validated. Lindsey wants her to experience the freedom and joy found in the unconditional love of God whether or not she is in a romantic

relationship. At the end of their visit, the young lady looked at Lindsey and said, "Thanks again for meeting with me! You're, like, so chill, and I feel like I can just be me."
